# Erie Branch awards \$13,500 in scholarships at May dinner

Two types of awards were given this year – Adult Scholarship Awards of \$3,000 per student and \$1,500 Refugee/Immigrant (RISA) awards.

#### Adult scholarship recipients

**Brenda Medina** is a senior at Mercyhurst University. She will complete her bachelor's degree next fall in English with a minor in sociology. She plans to begin work on her master's degree in Secondary Education after that. Brenda's goal is to teach middle school or high school language arts. Her education was interrupted so she could care for multiple family members dealing with health, depression, suicide, loss of housing, and financial issues. Thereafter she had to deal with her own very serious health issue. To say the least, it has been a very challenging time for her. ## Edie Cultu named Outstanding Woman

**Edie Cultu** was honored as Erie Branch's *Outstanding Woman of the Year.* The award, bestowed at the annual meeting, recognizes her dedication to promoting and increasing awareness of diversity, equity and inclusion in our workplaces, schools, and community. Edie was introduced by Loretto

Bellicini.

A retired teacher from Edison Elementary, an inner-city school in the Erie School District, Edie has held numerous positions in our branch, including two terms as President. About 20 years ago she originated the community outreach program called Global Friends that welcomed and supported immigrant women to our community. She is married to an immigrant from Turkey and understands the frustration and obstacles immigrants face in Erie.

Her special project, Global Friends, welcomes and supports immigrant and refugee women in our community. The group learns about the new immigrants' cultures and offers understanding and respect for their customs and traditions. Edie in turn shares her experiences and knowledge of life in Erie. The Global Friends study group has also cleaned apartments

for new Afghan refugees to move into and showed them how to walk their children to school. She also helped raise money to buy books to help immigrants learn English.

Last year, Edie and other branch members formed the Community Action Committee to provide services for those in need in our town. Edie organized the branch's collection of winter clothing, household items, food and baby products, dishes, pots and pans, curtains, linens and bags and bags of non-perishable food items to help sustain the Afghan families on their arrival in the Erie community. These contributions have eased the strain on the resettlement agencies, who received a large influx of refugees in a short span of time. She also organized voter registrations to help new citizens become active in local elections. Most recently she served two terms as AAUW Membership Chair. She developed new member brochures for potential members. She maintained and grew membership in the Erie branch throughout the Pandemic. Many of the current AAUW Erie Branch members are also immigrants to this country and were introduced to the group through Edie's efforts.

In the past, Christy was instrumental in obtaining authors for our Lunch & Literature fundraiser, was the instigator for our collaboration with Mercyhurst University and the Friends of the Library to bring author Marie Benedict to Erie, served as our branch president, and managed the archiving of our branch records. She has served as publicity/social media chair, and has always been willing to help where needed.

This year, she focused on revisions to our branch's website, with a focus on improving management and updating. She quickly came to the conclusion that the site was too cumbersome and outdated and needed to be rebuilt. Then it would again help AAUW Erie be a more effective organization. She recommended to the Board that we start over with professional help and, after researching various web design companies,

convinced the Board to allocate the money needed to make it happen. Since last September, she has been working tirelessly providing information and working with the web designers to bring things up to speed.

Named AAUW Educational Foundation Named Gift honoree was Sharmin Khundker. Sharmin, who served as Co-Program Vice President for the Branch this year, is also the

past President of the Erie Asian Pacific American Association. She was introduced by Niken Astari Carpenter. Sharmin obtained her bachelor degree in Applied Chemistry and doctoral degree in Analytical Chemistry, both awarded from the University of Northumbria, UK. She immigrated from Bangladesh to the United States in 1996 when she married her husband, who was a graduate student at the time. She has also worked as an analytical chemist in a contract pharmaceutical company. Ten years later, in 2006, Sharmin received her green card, and five years later in 2011, she received her U.S. citizenship.

Sharmin's role in Erie APAA has allowed new Americans to both showcase their cultures in the city and to network among themselves to form close, cultural communities that support the values of diversity and inclusion alike. Her role has allowed expansion of the role and integration of new Americans into the greater Erie community. Although there are bridges/ organizations being made for new Americans, such as the New American Council, Sharmin would like to see more being done so new Americans

can utilize their skills throughout the city. She would like to discuss more ways that new Americans can gain representation as well.

One of Sharmin's biggest focuses is the mitigation of the language barrier and the creation of access to transparent communication amongst stakeholders.

She also worked as a hospice volunteer and later worked at a Covid clinic during the pandemic. During this time, she grew a love for the medical field and currently is enrolled at Gannon University with the goal of becoming a Physician's Assistant.

She hopes to help in rural areas of PA, where healthcare is spread thin. Growing up in her village, she saw neighbors put off care because of a lack of choices and because the hospital was far away. Skylar wants to be able to give back to the community and improve this situation in rural PA with the skills that she learns.

**Rebecca Stanopiewicz** has a common theme in her life, service to our community's youth. This work has taken several paths. She has served on mission trips to establish community programs and centers for at-risk youth, volunteered in area shelters, participated in community projects that benefit youth, and serves in the classroom. For seven years she has been an Instructional Paraprofessional at Iroquois Elementary School in the Emotional Support Program. She has felt gratified while supporting these learners to find their success. In the past two years she has been a Pre-K teacher at Saint Luke School helping her students build a strong foundation.

Rebecca is a wife and mother of two active daughters. In watching her girls setting and achieving their goals, she decided to set her goal to complete her education. Her daughters are her biggest cheerleaders. She is grateful to know that she is passing on her strength and determination by achieving her goal of getting certified in Elementary Education and Special Education.

### Refugee and Immigrant Scholarship (RISA) recipients

**Nadia Mir Ali** said that she "grew up in a place where education is a dream that never comes true." In her native Afghanistan, she started in a nursing program while she was still in high school. Her family was very supportive of her education. During her training she would work with her husband, who is a trauma surgeon and served in the U.S. military.

When the U.S. pulled out of Afghanistan, they had to flee so they would not be persecuted by the Taliban. She came to the United States with her husband and daughter and now they are a family of four. She feels very lucky to have a safe place like Erie to call home. Like many working mothers she is juggling work, family and education (ESL classes). Nadia is looking forward to getting back to her career in nursing. This means having to start over to earn a BSN, pass NCLEX-RN, work two years in a clinical setting, and then getting her MSN to become a nurse practitioner.

**Nadine Nguengo** is a single mother of two children and a recent refugee to Erie from the Central African Republic (CAR). Years of religious conflict forced her to flee her country and stop her pursuit of university studies. She went to Mauretania in 2014 but was not welcomed there. While there she could not continue her education, but she would like to do so here. The Central African Republic is a French-speaking country,

and she did all her studies in French. Nadine is enrolled to start ESL classes at Gannon this summer. After learning English, she wants to continue university studies in the field of economics and social work. Her career goal is to become an entrepreneur and establish businesses to employ workers and in turn reduce the unemployment rate. Her personal goal is to be reunited with her children.

**Alphonsine Rehema** loves helping people and nursing is one of the best ways to do that. She has been wanting to become a nurse since middle school but there have been many challenges. The classes are rigorous but when the goal is noble you keep working as hard as you can. She tries to stay positive and to stay strong.

She is working and praying to do her best so that she can help others. It gives her so much satisfaction to watch people improve and recover. Alphonsine is trying to use all available resources to help achieve her dream. She is so grateful for all the scholarships and loans received.
