The speakers for the evening will be Executive Director Heather May Caster, Neighborhood Manager Margarita Dangel, and Sister Phyllis Hilbert SSJ, Neighborhood Advocate. Their presentation will feature the agency's mission: "Revitalizing a Neighborhood, Empowering its People."

The SSJNN serve the needs of impoverished residents in several of Erie's oldest neighborhoods, which span an area roughly bounded by East Avenue and Cranberry Street between 12th and 26th streets.

The Network is sponsored by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Northwestern Pennsylvania. Their mission statement says the following: "The SSJ Neighborhood Network, sponsored by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Northwestern Pennsylvania, provides leadership, advocates for local residents and partners with the broader community to develop opportunities for both personal growth and neighborhood revitalization."

SSJNN fulfills its mission by creating many programs that include one-on-one advocacy for the residents, emergency assistance with food and hygiene products, a weekly soup kitchen, affordable housing, as well as community gardens and a seasonal farmers market.

Other endeavors include a community bike program and enrichment programs for the youth in the neighborhoods.

Join us Monday, Feb. 13, at 7 p.m. to learn more about their vision and the wonderful programs that are a part of the SSJ Neighborhood Network.

Because the website is public facing, please keep the following best practices in mind for photos:

- **Take several photos so that you can choose the best shot.**
- **Capture action when possible.** For instance, if the Gourmet group visits a local ethnic restaurant, a picture of the chef talking to the group, or a close-up of a photogenic dish being handed to a member, is more dynamic than a photo of group members sitting at a table. We need to think about what the photos convey to viewers who do not know us as individuals.
- **Feature the AAUW logo/name in the shot if applicable.** This can be a sign, a banner, or promotional materials. These express our identity immediately and visually.
- **Convey diversity.** Whether we envision diversity as age or race/ethnicity, we want the website to show how we represent various identities and life experiences.

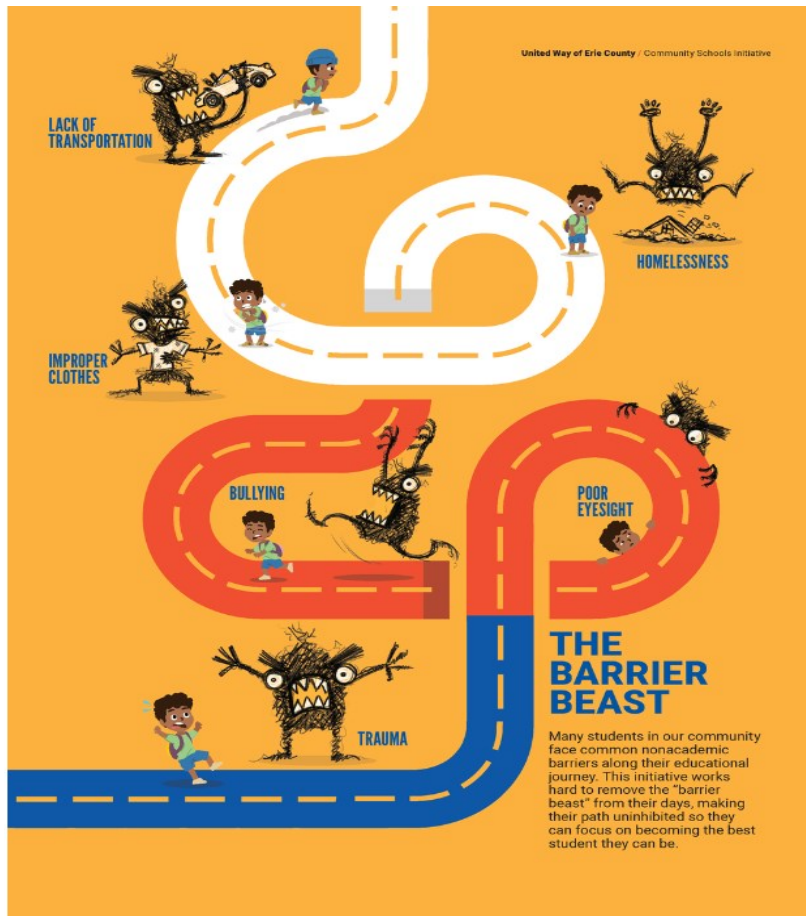

Community schools target barriers to learning

All 13 Erie middle and elementary schools, as well as some in the Girard, Union City and Iroquois school districts, are participants in the United Way of Erie County's Community Schools initiative, branch members learned at January's virtual meeting.



The Community Schools initiative aims to crush generational poverty, Julie Chacona, Chief Development Officer at United Way of Erie County explained. To do so, it relies on the collaboration of many partners. In addition to the school districts, social service organizations, businesses, the public sector, universities and more participate.

Via a data-driven process, the 16 member schools receive help with non-academic barriers, allowing the school administrators to focus on academics. Pillars of the Community Schools model are: family engagement, expanded learning times, providing a positive environment for wellness/learning and cementing a community/neighborhood partnership.

Chacona introduced those attending the Zoom meeting to a history of Erie's Public Schools, which have served as learning centers in their neighborhoods. Now the collaboration with United Way aims to fight the high child poverty rate.

While the program is already delivering some measurable results from the increased community involvement, including school attendance, "it will take a generation" to make an economic difference, she said. "Investing in our next generation will be the way our city thrives in the future."

Each participating school faces its own unique challenges – as an example she noted that students at East Middle School speak 23 languages. Many schools have students who walk the 1.5 miles to school, leading to the development of "walking school buses" to improve safety. Partner organizations created murals on some buildings along the way for beautification.

With parental approval, students' health issues are addressed via screenings for dental, vision, and other health issues. In some buildings with medical partnerships, these can be treated right in house.

Teachers currently working in community schools tend to stay on, she said, as those who don't believe in the concept left early.

United Way of Erie County, as initiative coordinator, employs the individual Community School Directors, who in turn provide technical assistance, maintain alignment, see to clear communication, and assure the work is being implemented with fidelity by all partners and meeting goals and measurements.

Corporate partners commit to financial and volunteer support for a minimum of three years for each participating building.

Every resource and program that is brought into the community school is aligned with the Action Plan developed by the Community School Director and United Way with input from partners. The plan is updated regularly and ensures all activities in the school are aligned to address identified needs.

Detailed strategies, action steps, outputs, outcomes, indicators, data sources and measurements are included for four domains: student, family, school, and district.

Pregnant Worker Fairness Act to take effect

The United States Senate voted 73 to 24 recently to pass the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act (PWFA).

With this overwhelming bipartisan support, PWFA passed as an amendment to the omnibus bill.

This momentous win allows millions of pregnant people to finally provide for their families without compromising their health or pregnancies.

The PWFA will:

- Give pregnant workers access to basic accommodations like carrying a water bottle and taking bathroom breaks.
- Clarify that it is unlawful to discriminate against pregnant workers by forcing them out of their jobs unnecessarily or denying them reasonable accommodations.
- Prohibit employers from retaliating against pregnant workers who request accommodations.

It's your AAUW, and your voice counts. It's time to comment on and propose changes to the AAUW bylaws and Public Policy Priorities.

This spring AAUW members will be asked to vote on amendments to the national bylaws recommended by the AAUW Board of Directors and AAUW Governance Committee.

In accordance with AAUW's bylaws, every AAUW member has the right to comment on proposed changes to the bylaws before they are put to the membership for a vote. Members may also propose changes to the Public Policy Priorities.

You'll find all the information you need to comment on the proposed bylaws changes and propose your own changes to the Public Policy Priorities online. Comments were due Jan. 27.
